PLANNING UPDATE

Municipal Gravel Pit

Councillor Frank Leonard's proposal for a geotechnical study on the municipal pit was accepted by Saanich Council earlier this summer. The work was carried out, and a report submitted on August 29, 1994. This report has been studied by the Cordova Bay Planning Committee, and our comments will be passed on to Councillor Leonard.

The study was a preliminary one, which included representative drilling and sampling. The character and depth of fill now in place was identified. Observations were made of the undisturbed native soil and of the character and behaviour of ground water and seepages, and identified safe slopes for both normal and seismic loading.

The report made it clear that substantial filling and compaction of fill, as well as regular monitoring of the filling and compaction processes, would be required before any residential development could take place there. It estimated that about 5 years will be required before the fill has settled enough for building to take place. It also estimated that 5 to 9 years would be required to fill the active pit to original grade at the present rate of filling. Undisturbed areas of the pit could accommodate most structures without alteration.

The planning committee chairman of the Association, along with a representative of residents adjacent to the pit, various Saanich department heads, and the municipal administrator, attended a meeting on September 13 to discuss a plan of activity for the next three months. It considered some preliminary concepts on how to shut down the municipal pit and proceed with residential or other development. Wayne Randall, Lands Commissioner for Saanich, will provide an economic analysis of each of the preliminary concepts. Councillor Leonard will meet with the Association in late October to outline possible courses of action and get community input.

The Trio pit is not part of this initiative at present, because it is privately owned.

Housing Development at Mattick's Farm

McArthur Park Estates, the owners of the treed area between the market and Cordova Bay Road to the south, are planning to begin residential development there and at Mattick's Farm. Mr. Mohan Jawl and his architect met the Cordova Bay Association planning committee to review his proposals and to look over the site.

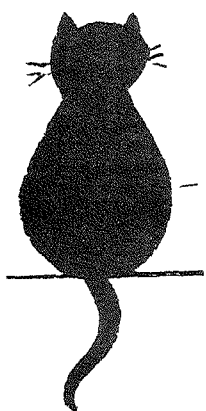
Very broadly, it is proposed that the existing market would be augmented and restructured, and residential development designed to retain as much tree cover as possible.

The proposal has to run the gamut of Saanich development requirements and may well undergo changes before the final design is approved. Mr. Jawl intends to hold a general public meeting once the requirements are completed. The Association will keep you informed.

Sea Wall at Cordova Bay Park (adjacent to Parkview Store)

The four properties immediately north of the park suffered erosion after a storm in December 1992. There is evidence that the position and angle of the seawall built by Saanich in front of the park contributed to the erosion. The seawall was built to protect the sewage pumping station, and it now develops that it was built by Saanich on the foreshore beach without the permission of the provincial government.

Saanich had refused to discuss remedial measures with the property owners. The Cordova Bay Association felt the owners had not been fairly treated, and supported them with a letter to Council.

When the issue came up before Saanich Council, the Engineering Department and the affected residents were directed to meet and come up with a mutually satisfactory solution by September 30, in time for corrective work to be done before the winter storms.

Cyclist and Pedestrian Safety Improvements, Cordova Bay Road from Mt. Douglas Park to Royal Oak Drive

The residents in this area have no sidewalk or bike path alongside the road, and vehicle traffic has increased considerably. Prior to the road repair in July, all the residents presented a petition to Saanich Council requesting that bicycle and pedestrian paths be provided when the road improvements were done.

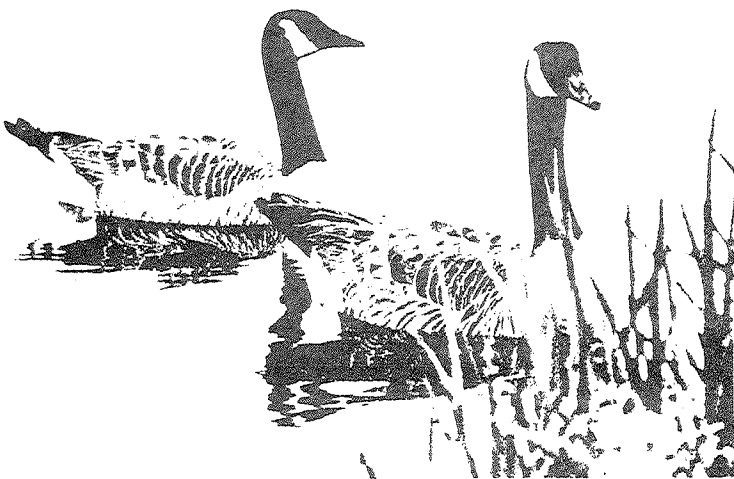
The road was resurfaced, and no pedestrian or bike path was included.

The situation is worse in some stretches because the road shoulder is gone. This was discussed at Saanich Council on August 15, and Council passed a motion "that staff...provide budget estimates for the improvements, including street lights...for inclusion in 1995 budget deliberations.

Your Association supports the residents, and requested that Saanich provide a temporary footpath until something more permanent is installed.

Subdivisions

Requests to subdivide have been sought for 5173 Cordova Bay Road and for 5196 DelMonte. 5173 will come before a public hearing before long, and 5196 will come back to Saanich Council in the near future.

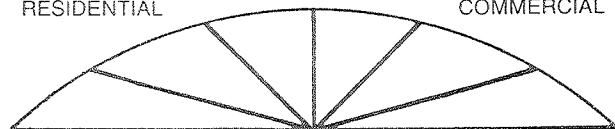

The Friends of Mt. Douglas Park Society

The A.G.M. was a great success, with a lively presentation from the Victoria Orienteering group, an overview of park developments in the region by Andrew Petter and a video from David Suzuki on the shortcomings of current shoreline protection methods. The last was of immediate importance because Saanich's engineering department brought forward their plan to secure the cliff immediately below the section of road that has been stabilized. It called for an angled, armored wall which would extend into the park and link to the existing rip rap.

The cost was estimated at more than a million dollars, three times the original figure; Council has not made a final decision but has called for more details and possible alternatives. Since then, the issue of erosion close to the pumping station in the a heart of Cordova Bay has been in the news. We feel it is part of the same problem and have asked for a beach management committee to be set up so that these problems can be dealt with as part of an overall coastal management process rather than the present piecemeal approach.

The other major development has been the acceptance by Saanich Council that Royal Oak Drive will be a two lane road with strategic turning lanes and bicycle and pedestrian lanes. This removes the major threat to park and to the surrounding communities, which four lanes of motor traffic would have posed. The road through the park was resurfaced this summer; it was very carefully done and the new surface is much quieter than the old one. To take maximum advantage of these developments, we proposed that pedestrian and bicycle lanes should be continued from Royal Oak Drive / Blenkinsop through the park to Gordon Head. There is a very real possibility that the first stage of this process will be done next year and you will be able to walk from anywhere in Cordova Bay to the park and its trail system and then back again without taking your life in your hands. For cyclists it would mean a designated path on the sea side of Cordova Bay Road which would make the climb up from Ash Road less harassing.

Our next meeting will be in late October and the theme will be the proposed " Greenway Concept", which would link the new and existing parks in the region together as a counterpart to the highway system. There will be a news letter and advertisements; with luck we will be back in Claremont High School after a long spell of wandering .

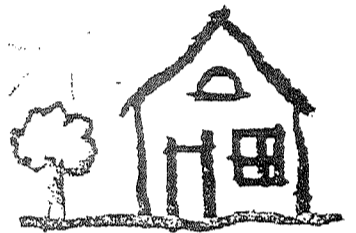
