#### **President's Corner**

With spring just around the corner, and with COVID restrictions continuing to ease, we've much to look forward to here in Cordova Bay. At the CBA Board level, our calendar is gradually filling up with some key events. Not the least of these is our AGM (April 27th) and - fingers crossed - the return of Cordova Bay Day later in June. And, of course, prior to both of these we'll hopefully have a final verdict on the adoption of the Proposed Cordova Bay Local Area Plan Update (LAP) to be tabled at the public hearing scheduled for March 15th.

As you know, the CBA is a strong supporter of the new LAP, even with its imperfections! In balance, we feel the LAP is worthy of merit and hope that our elected officials will see it that way too. Inevitably, on matters such as this, there's bound to be differences of opinion. It's important though that we respect that, and hopefully we can move forward in harmony. At the public hearing, you will have the opportunity to voice your opinion on the plan. (For more on the LAP, see Barb's report within these pages.)

Regarding the AGM, as PHO guidelines currently stand, we are planning on holding this in-person, at the CB55+ Centre. Provisional arrangements are in hand, and will be confirmed closer to the date. A key process at the AGM is always the election/re-election of directors of the Association. This year we will have eight seats to fill; one of them unfortunately being a replacement for former Planning Co-Chair Annie Djiotsa who had to stand down earlier in the year because of family matters. Annie was a breath of fresh air on the Board, and we are sure to miss her. I should also mention that I will not be seeking re-election, having tendered my resignation from the Board with effect following the AGM.

Hopefully our members will respond by stepping forward to complete the slate. (See the call for nominations elsewhere in the Newsletter.)

Road safety matters continue to be at the forefront; the most recent development being the announcement from Saanich Engineering about the go-ahead of the Cordova Bay Road Sidewalk Improvement Project (on the east side, from Walema to the entrance to Mattick's Woods, opposite Rambler). The project will also cover work on Fenn and Parker (partially). Here again, some residents are opposed demonstrating once more that not everyone can be pleased all of the time. Opinions vary throughout our community, but hopefully these can be dealt with in a respectful fashion.

Along the corridor, the issue of speed is again being raised by neighbourhoods near the Mt. Doug Parkway stretch and along Sayward. The tragic accident on Cedar Hill X Road shortly before Christmas has undoubtedly heightened concerns.

It was interesting to note a comment in a recent Times Colonist article indicating that our Mayor's Speed Reduction Pilot Project had been dismissed by the Province. On a more positive note, we're now hearing of work being undertaken by Engineering with regards to developing "A Policy Framework for Road Safety in Saanich"; the aim being to have Council adopt the principles of the "Vision Zero" approach as the basis of a Road Safety Action Plan for Saanich. We applaud this move but have to ask why such an initiative has taken so long: a commitment to Vision Zero is a formal acknowledgement that road safety is a top priority. Wasn't that part of our elected officials' platform four years ago?

Mike has hit the hot spots with his Planning report, and in doing so has showcased The Haro as it moves towards completion and resident occupation. With the Doumac apartment block also now approved, we look forward to seeing the traffic light/sidewalk installation at this intersection being finished off in timely fashion. The rezoning/development permit approval for the new Community Club, despite objection from a few quarters, was also welcomed.

I'm delighted to see the return of our Claremont journalist, Ruby Enns, to these pages. I'm sure you'll enjoy her refreshing contribution. Welcome too to the continuation of the Photo Contest.

And so too will our readers recall the article in our Summer '21 edition on the Doris Page Park Renewal Concept. One of the most pleasing developments in the past little while was the endorsement by the Saanich Parks, Trails & Recreation Advisory Committee of this project. At their meeting on February 23rd, a presentation given by our visionary resident, Anita Kess, was given the unanimous support to move forward under the Saanich "Pulling Together" program at the earliest. Anita has also been enthusiastically embraced by Coleen Rogers, not only another CB resident but also the president of the Victoria Master Gardener Association. Sincere congratulations to both these ladies; Cordova Bay will reap the benefit of your initiative.

And finally, to end on another Spring note, be sure to check out the sound advice from our Saanich Police Block Watch folks, and their tips for keeping your home secure.

# Notice from the Nominations Committee

The CBA bylaw 4.3 states that five directors shall be elected or re-elected at one annual general meeting and the other six shall be elected or re-elected at the following annual general meeting. # Local Area Plan Update

Good news! At Saanich Council's Committee of the Whole meeting on January 31st, 2022, the Proposed Cordova Bay Local Area Plan (LAP) was approved to go to public hearing (the final step) on March 15, 2022.

The LAP document will guide Cordova Bay development decisions for the next 20-30 years. Residents are encouraged to review the Proposed LAP on the Saanich website at Cordova Bay Local Area Plan Update | District of Saanich.

CBA fully supports the adoption of the LAP because it has been developed with significant opportunities for public input and the majority of resident visions for the future of Cordova Bay are reflected.

It is extremely important that as many residents as possible send in their opinion/comments to Saanich on this final opportunity to have the LAP approved.



#### **Traffic Report**

Spring is finally in the air, daffodils are blooming, the birds are singing, and the sun is starting to make more regular appearances. It is a natural time for most of us to want to get out and enjoy fresh air and the stunning beauty of our community. This means more pedestrians, cyclists, children and dogs will be out on our streets, sidewalks and parks. Here are some safety reminders and tips that might be helpful for us to remember.

Pedestrians: Be aware of your surroundings at intersections and crosswalks. Do not take for granted that drivers will see you in crosswalks or obey traffic signals. Make eye contact and walk defensively!

Think about being visible to drivers while walking at night by wearing reflective clothing or using a flashlight.

When walking on roads without sidewalks, walk facing oncoming traffic to heighten your visibility.

Remember to wear your helmet and visibility clothing/gear.

If you are planning to cross in a crosswalk, remember to walk your bike across and follow the traffic signals as a pedestrian.

Motor Vehicle Operators: Speed and alert driving continue to be a concern for your fellow Cordova Bay residents. Follow posted speed limits and stay focused and alert without distractions. Watch for pedestrians crossing the road particularly in areas with no crosswalks.

Let's all stay safe out there as we start to enjoy warmer weather.

# **Planning Committee Report**

In this edition of the Cordovan, as your planning chair, I would like to highlight three major projects in our community. Let's start with The Haro, our largest project under construction in Cordova Bay. The Shoreline and The Breakwater, the two buildings in Phase 1, have received occupancy permits and residents are moving in. Note that these two buildings have sold 100% of the residential units, as per the developer's website. The Ocean Breeze, or Phase 2, is under construction, and the developer's website indicates they have sold 90% of the residential units. We have just received news that we will see these businesses in the complex:

In the mean time, we can take in the landscaping and relax on the new various outdoor seating areas.



Many long term residents of Cordova Bay, such as myself, have spent many hours over the years enjoying time playing in the Cordova Bay Community Club, located at 941 Sutcliffe Road. The following statement was recently posted on Cordova Bay Community Club's website (https://

cordovabaycommunityclub.ca) "Rezoning was unanimously approved by Saanich Council at the public hearing February 15. Thanks to all who wrote in support of the application. We'll have more news in the coming weeks about the next stage in our process and fundraising". The website offers a 3D rendering and site plan which provides details such as the footprint/location of the building, court layouts and parking.

986-990 Doumac Avenue was also unanimously approved by Saanich Council at a public

hearing on Feb. 15, 2022. Developer, Citta Construction, has been given the 'go ahead' to build 4 storey, 17 unit strata-titled building on the corner of Doumas Avenue at Cordova Bay Road. # **Capstones at Claremont**

As part of the BC school curriculum, senior students are required to complete a capstone project for their Career Life Connections (CLC) course in order to graduate. A capstone is an open-ended project that allows students to dig deeper into their passions and gain mentorship from teachers in areas that interest them. According to the BC Course Curriculum website,

"The capstone is a rigorous learning opportunity that allows students to reflect and share in personally meaningful ways." This project is something that is taken very seriously at Claremont, as teachers and administrators alike believe it is something that can help pave the way for a student's success.

Over the last few years, a team of teachers at Claremont have looked at ways to maximise the positive impact this project has on students. To them, this meant that when it came time for presentations, there should be more people viewing the students' projects than just their teachers and peers. For this reason, students are able to invite a mentor who helped them with their project, and the school invites members from the community, to come in and listen to the presenters. However, unfortunately due to the tightening of COVID-19 restrictions in January, the students from this past semester were not able to invite anyone in and were only able to book a time to present to a teacher individually.

Since the parameters of this project are so openended, the topics can vary drastically.

For Sarah Ma, a grade 12 student, she used the capstone project as an opportunity to regale her passion of photography while gaining advice on the small business she is building. Ma has loved photography from a young age and was given her first professional camera at the age of 11, which is

Some of her work includes shooting for the Victoria Annual Dragon Boat Festival, school and community events, and creating her own business for graduate and family portraits.
